
Interpretation: The above results reflect that approximately 98.1% of students have filled the survey form for the first time.

Q2. Genders:




Interpretation: The above results reflect that approximately 50.2% of the total students are female whereas 49.8% students are male. Transgenders account for 0% of the total response.

Q3. How much of the syllabus was covered in the class?





Q4. How well did the teachers prepare for the classes?




























